History

Farmington was developed in the 1960's by Don Cleckley, President of Cedar Park Corporation. The original sections ended at Whetstone. Subsequent sections were gradually developed, with architectural and usage covenants being filed by the developer. Today, most of Farmington consists of plats from the original plans filed by the Cedar Park Corporation; however, a few areas, 7-15 Whetstone and 9-24 Palisades. were developed later by other developers. Whether part of the original plan, or added in recent years, all families who drive through the Farmington entrance are considered to be part of the Farmington family.

No Homeowner's Association was created when Cedar Park submitted plans for the development, so Farmington does not have a mandatory HOA. In the late 1960's, the Farmington Recreation Association formed to investigate creating common recreation facilities. This organization disbanded in 1975 and no facilities were pursued.

In 1990, residents formed the Farmington Civic Association. Its purpose is to promote and encourage a better community and civic spirit, and to foster goodwill and friendship among all residents. The FCA maintains close communication with the Hampton Police Department and other city departments to promote community safety and involvement.

Palisade Home Owner's Association was created in 2013 for homes 9-24 Palisade when that area was developed. It collects a mandatory fee. The Palisade HOA has arranged for its residents to become members of the FCA through the annual HOA fees already collected.

Communication

The Farmington Civic Association uses several methods of communication to keep neighbors involved and informed. Each street or section of a street has an assigned block captain who acts as a liaison between the association and the residents. Block captains welcome new neighbors, pass along resident concerns, and help pass along information from the association.

Quarterly newsletters are published and distributed via mail. Articles in the newsletter inform residents of upcoming events, safety tips, and happenings in the city.

"Nextdoor Farmington" is a public web-based chat board in which any member of the community can sign up and post information of interest. Residents often post about upcoming events, lost items, and safety concerns. Members can sign up for email alerts which keep neighbors informed as topics are posted.

Reminders, notices, and messages of appreciation are often posted at the message board near the exit of the neighborhood.

The Farmington Civic Association has a membership drive annually to fund events and initiatives. Community Information

General Information

The information below is information about city services and ordinances that the City of Hampton has put in place. This information is provided as a service to residents.

Trash is picked up every Monday. (Green Bin) Oversized articles may be left at the curb. Separate bulk yard debris from bulk trash.

Recycle is picked up every other Monday. (Grey Bin) (green days on the city calendar) Flatten large cardboard boxes and stack near the recycle can for pick up.

Put leaves or grass clippings and non-bulk yard debris in <u>clear</u> bags. The city will not will not dispose of piles of leaves on the curb.

The speed limit in Farmington is 25 MPH. The police monitor to enforce this limit.

Streets are swept very third Thursday. Avoid parking in street when street sweeping is scheduled.

City Ordinance prohibits posting personal signs on public areas. This includes medians.

City ordinances require dog excrement be disposed of by the dog owner.

City ordinance does not allow for dogs to roam at large; additionally, dogs may not be tethered.

Parts of Farmington have drainage or utility easements and a few sections may be in flood zones based on updated FEMA maps. Make sure you access your plat information on the city website if you have any questions or concerns.

Understanding Covenants

Covenants are created by the developer of a subdivision, are legally recorded at the Clerk or Courts, and run with the land. Information about the length of time covenants are valid, how covenants are renewed, and the process undertaken to change covenants are included in the covenants themselves.

Covenants include architectural requirements, landscape requirements and land usage restrictions. Covenants are in addition to any city ordnance and the stricter of the two apply when there is a conflict between a covenant and an ordinance.

Upon purchase, a thorough title search <u>should</u> discover recorded covenants, but a buyer does not have to "agree" to the covenants at time of purchase in order for them to be enforceable. Any member of the community has the right to bring legal action against a neighbor for breaking a covenant.

In a community with a home owner's association

(HOA or POA), the developer created the HOA and the rules it would operate under at the time of development. In communities with HOA's, the HOA is responsible for collecting mandatory fees and enforcing rules.

Farmington does not have an HOA created at the time of development. Palisade HOA only regulates homes 9-24 on Palisade Point, and was created when that section was developed in 2013.

The Farmington Civic Association only provides information about the covenants as a service to the community. FCA did not create any covenants, can't change the covenants, does not sponsor activities that knowingly break covenants, and does not enforce covenants.

Joining the FCA does not apply any additional covenants on you. The covenants in the neighborhood are enforceable by anyone in the neighborhood whether you belong to the association or not.

Covenants by Section

Most covenants are in reference to architectural guidelines at the time of the build. However, there are covenants which impact changes or additions to the homes as well as permitted activities on the property. Home owners are encouraged to go to the Clerk of Courts to look up their specific covenants if they were not provided them at the time of purchase by their closing office. It will be easier to look them up under the developer's name – which is Cedar Park Corporation for MOST of Farmington.

Residence in some sections of Farmington (7-15 Whetstone, some homes at the main entrance, and Palisade 9-24) are not part of the Cedar Park development plat and may have different covenants. These residents should check at the Clerk of Courts, locating the covenants by developer, to determine their covenants.

The following document provides a summary of Cedar Park covenants by section, but are not the entirety.
